Annual Report of the Board of Directors

OF THE

SOUTH ORANGE LIBRARY ASSOCIATION.

NOVEMBER, 1869.

THE Board of Directors of the SOUTH ORANGE LIBRARY ASSOCIATION respectfully present their Fifth Annual Report.

A review of the year 1869 in the work of this Association affords the Directors great satisfaction, for, although there is an absence of prominent features such as challenged special attention in the last report, a steady growth has been maintained which promises well for the future. One year ago the incubus of debt was removed, thus enabling the Institution to rise to new vigor and attain a more substantial prosperity. The pleasant and successful method by which that debt was removed still remains a bright green spot in the memory of the friends of the Association. The last year closed with a balance of \$313.96 in the treasury, and the Treasurer's report for the present year will show that an income of \$228.50 was received from the payment of annual dues, and \$44.87 from all other sources; the expenditures being about \$125.00 for new books and \$303.60 for the usual necessary outlay in payment of salaries, rent, &c., leaving a balance of \$179.56 to the credit of the Association, or, with an amount now due from the members and not appearing in the report, over \$200.00.

The Directors congratulate the Association on this exhibit.

Additions by purchase and donation of 135 volumes have been made since the last report, being more than twice the number

added in the previous year, and the Library now numbers 1,145 volumes. This is inclusive of 125 volumes in the French language.

Information derived from the Librarian's books enables the Directors to state that these volumes do not rest idly upon our shelves—silent repositories of learning and wisdom—but that, kept in constant circulation, they are in the main found to be very acceptable to the readers of the Association. 2,886 volumes have been issued to the order of members during the year, being about 25 books for each member, and an increase of nearly 700 above the number drawn in the previous year. The increase in membership is too small to account for this increase in the use of the Library, and the natural inference is that our Institution is meeting, in some good degree, the wants of a community of readers.

In respect to the character of the reading matter most in demand, we find that of the above-named total of books taken out for perusal in a single year, 2,185 were tales and novels, and 701 works of travel, biography, poetry, and history. Of the additions, it may be said that they have been of a more solid character than in some of the years preceding, and if not such as are most in demand, yet such as are calculated to keep up the high character of our Library. While some would regret the existence of a taste calling for light literature in such quantities, it is to be remembered that we cannot control the tastes of our patrons, and that our responsibility as conservators of the public morals may be properly discharged by seeing to it that nothing objectionable on moral grounds finds a place upon our shelves. Since the novels must be furnished, all that can be asked is that the sensational and immoral class be excluded, and those of the highest order secured. This has always been the aim of the officers of the Association—an aim which, they feel proud to say, has thus far been attended with marked success.

The subscription list, as already intimated, has not grown very rapidly of late, an increase of only 31 new names appearing upon our roll of members for the year 1869, and only 32

for the year 1868. We now number 118 members, 84 being gentlemen, and 34 ladies. Only two of the members do not draw books.

In addition to the books of the Library, we now have in our reading-room fourteen newspapers and magazines, as follows:

The reading-room is daily visited by some of the members, and the periodicals give evidence of being used.

The laborious task of compiling and arranging a complete catalogue of the contents of the Library has been undertaken for the first time during the present year, and it is expected that we will very soon enjoy the advantages which the possession of a printed catalogue will afford us.

Looking forward to the future, the Directors believe that the lessons of their experience teach that this Association has yet before it a greater field of usefulness. What has been accomplished is but the earnest of what may yet be done. With enlarged views, greater enterprise, and continued industry on the part of its Managers, this Institution may advance beyond its present position of secured permanency to exert a wider influence in moulding the minds and tastes of the young and of the community generally. One hundred and eighteen is, after all, but a small number of subscribers for so populous a

village as that of South Orange. Our list should be at least twice as great, so that the financial basis might be such as to render unnecessary any future calls upon the officers or the public such as have been made in the past. An increased subscription list would enable the Directors not only to make greater additions to the Library, but to carry out those plans for improvement and extended usefulness which are from time to time suggested. The Board feels in a position to ask the community, in which this Library is a great educational influence, to co-operate with us in maintaining its existence, and in increasing its means of usefulness. The owners of real estate in this vicinity could well afford to support it as a public benefaction. It is of great importance to many young men who may be comparatively deficient in the opportunities for passing an occasional evening pleasantly and intellectually, to have a resort which they may frequent for recreation and instruction. Farmers and business men have a special interest in encouraging the habit of doing so, not only in their own children, but in the children of their neighbors and in those whom they employ.

It is the opinion of many of the Directors that, should the Purchasing Committee, at the very beginning of the ensuing year, expend as large an amount of money as that expended in the year just closed, in placing on our shelves such works as our patrons are demanding, the Association would speedily reap the permanent results of such a measure.

The importance of having the Association incorporated, for the sake of certain legal advantages that would accrue to us, is beginning to be so seriously felt that it is presumed that the incorporation will be secured within the coming year.

And now, with the expression of the pleasure they have had in endeavoring to discharge their trust, and in associating together at the meetings of the Board, and with high hopes for the future, the Directors commit the Institution, with all its valuable interests, to their successors, soon to be elected.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

REGULATIONS OF THE LIBRARY.

1.—The Library will be opened for the delivery and reception of books from 7.30 to 10 o'clock A.M., and 3 to 9 o'clock P.M. daily, excepting Sundays, public holidays, the day of the annual election, and such other days as the Board may direct.

2.—Books must in all cases be charged on the Librarian's ledger before they are taken from the Library.

3.—But one book, or two volumes of the same work, if a 12mo or smaller, will be delivered to any member, excepting family life members and members holding extra subscriptions.

4.—No book can be retained from the Library longer than two weeks. But any book (excepting such as are marked on the Catalogue "not to be renewed") may be renewed for one week before it is returned to the shelves, provided it is brought to the Library for this purpose, and charged again upon the ledger.

5.—No member can take out books on another's account, except by a written order; and if any books, thus taken out, are lost or injured, the person to whom they are charged will be held responsible.

PENALTIES.

1.—Members retaining books from the Library beyond the time specified in the Regulations, will be fined three cents per day on every book so retained.

2.—If any book is injured or lost, the person to whom such book is charged must replace the same, or pay an equivalent in money. If the book be one of a set, he shall receive the

odd volumes at an appraisal, to be fixed by the Library Committee.

3.—No member will be permitted to receive a book from the Library until he has paid all sums due from him to the Association, and made good all damages or losses which he has occasioned.

REGULATIONS OF THE READING-ROOM.

1.—The reading-room will be opened from 7.30 to 10 o'clock A.M., and from 3 to 9 o'clock P.M. daily, excepting Sundays, public holidays, the day of the Annual election, and such other days as the Board may direct.

2.—No member is allowed the privilege of the reading-room who is in arrears for dues to the Association, or fines incurred in the Library.

3.—Any member of the Association may introduce to the reading-room a friend, not a resident of South Orange, whose name must be registered by the Librarian, and who will receive a card of admission for four weeks. Persons thus introduced may consult books in the Library, but will not be allowed to remove any books from the room.

4.—No smoking or loud conversation is permitted in the reading-room.

5.—Gentlemen are requested not to wear their hats in the reading-room.

6.—No magazine or newspaper shall be taken from the reading-room without special permission, on penalty of expulsion upon detection.
